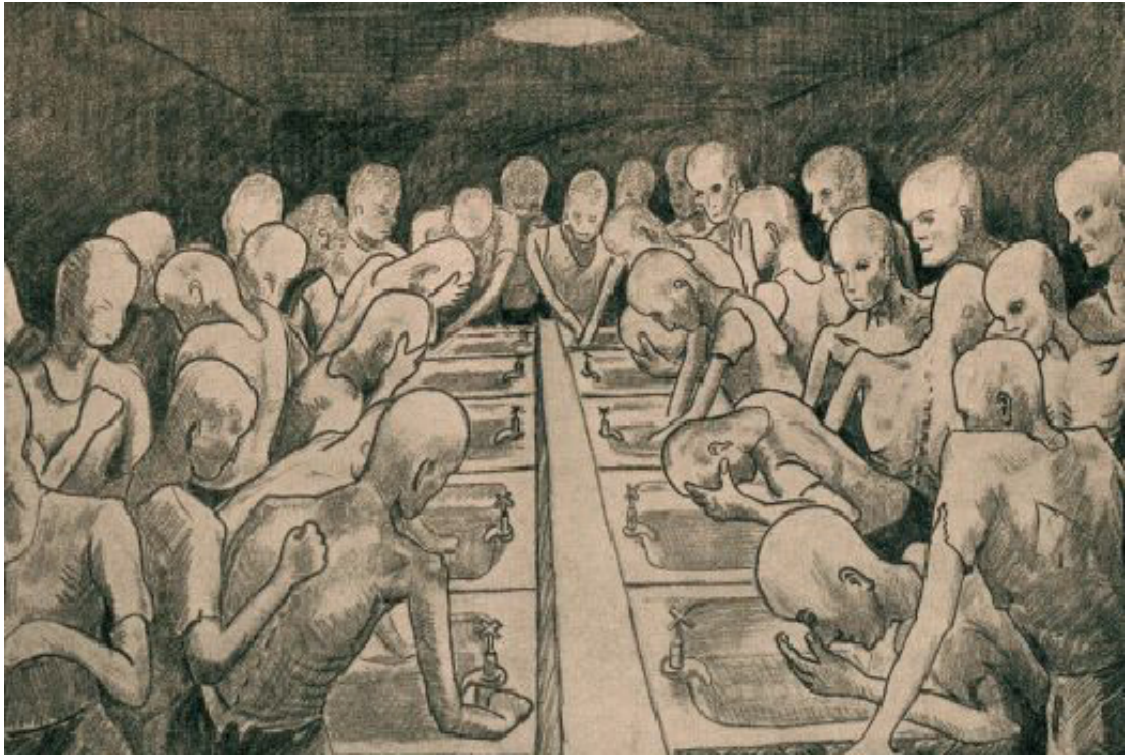


Drawing: Washroom



Drawing by Hans Peter Sørensen. This is the sixth drawing from his Neuengamme portfolio published in 1948. Print based on a pencil drawing. Hans Peter Sørensen added the following comments: "*A small room inside the block was used as a washroom. It was equipped with around 10 sinks which had to be used by 500 to 600 prisoners in the space of one hour every morning. Of course, many prisoners were therefore unable to wash at all, and this created an ideal breeding ground for lice.*"

Hans Peter Sørensen, a former prisoner from Denmark, was imprisoned in Neuengamme from October 1944.

Washed pencil drawing by Poul Eduard Mahler entitled: "Paa Toiletterne i Neuengamme" ("In the Toilets at Neuengamme"), 1945. Poul Eduard Mahler, a former prisoner from Denmark, was imprisoned in Neuengamme in March/April 1945. Conditions at the camp were very unhygienic. There were not enough toilets, and many prisoners who suffered from diarrhoea often were unable to find a place to relieve themselves in time. There was no toilet paper.
